6.	Read 2 Corinthians 5:21. To whom is this verse referring?

## **Discussion Guide for Your Life Group Meeting**

- I. At your Life Group meeting, first read **Psalm 118:13-18** aloud. It can be helpful to have several people each read one verse from their Bible. This helps people feel involved and can also introduce some interesting discussion if several translations are used. After reading the passage discuss it. If you are having trouble stimulating discussion, you can try asking some of the following questions:
  - 1. Read **Psalm 118:13** aloud again. Have you ever been *pushed so hard* by life's circumstances that you felt like you were falling? How did the Lord intervene to stop your downward spiral?
  - 2. Read **Psalm 118:14** aloud again. In what ways have you experienced the Lord's *strength* in your life?
    - What does the psalmist mean when he says *the Lord is my song?(ESV)*What does the psalmist mean when he says *the Lord is my defense? (NIV)*How does the *Lord become our salvation?*
  - 3. Read **Psalm 118:15-16** aloud again. What do these two verses mean to you?
  - 4. Read **Psalm 118:17** aloud again. Having been saved from death, what is the psalmist's immediate reaction (in other words, what is he inspired to do)?
  - 5. **Psalm 118:18** talks about the Lord's discipline. Turn to **Hebrews 12:5-11** and read it aloud. According to this passage, whom does the Lord discipline? How should we feel when the Lord disciplines us?
- II. Next read **Luke 4:16-21**, utilizing several group members to each read one verse aloud. After reading the passage discuss it. If you are having trouble stimulating discussion, you can try asking some of the following questions:
  - 1. Turn to **Isaiah 61:1-2** and read it aloud. This is a messianic prophecy proclaiming what the Messiah would do when He came. Now, read **Luke 4:21** aloud again. What is Jesus declaring here?
  - 2. As you read through **Luke 4:18-19**, how many of these things did Jesus do in His ministry on earth?
  - 3. If we are truly walking as a disciple of Christ, would **Luke 4:18-19** also apply to us?
  - 4. How could we find out if this really is applicable for our lives?
- III. Now read **2 Corinthians 5:16-21**, utilizing several group members to each read one verse aloud. After reading the passage discuss it. If you are having trouble stimulating discussion, you can try asking some of the following questions:
  - 1. In **2** Corinthians **5:16**, *Paul says he could no longer regard Christ according to the flesh*. What happened in Paul's life that changed the way he looked at Jesus?
  - 2. How did Paul's new regard for Christ affect the way he regarded all people?
