10. Read **Ephesians 4:32-5:2.** Name three virtues an imitator of Christ (or God) ought to display toward other people? (Hint: See **Eph. 4:32.**)

Discussion Guide for Your Life Group Meeting

- I. At your Life Group meeting, first read **Psalm 118:19-24** aloud. It can be helpful to have several people each read one verse from their Bible. This helps people feel involved and can also introduce some interesting discussion if several translations are used. After reading the passage discuss it. If you are having trouble stimulating discussion, you can try asking some of the following questions:
 - 1. In **Ps. 118:19**, what is the psalmist talking about when he refers to the *gates of righteousness?*
 - 2. What did Jesus do that allows us to access these gates whenever we want?
 - 3. Read **Ps. 118:20** aloud again. Then, turn to **John 10:7** and read it aloud. (Make sure someone reads the NIV translation aloud.) How does Jesus literally serve as the *gate of righteousness* for those who believe in Him?
 - 4. Read **Ps. 118:21.** How does Jesus answer the psalmist's prayer in **Ps. 118:19** to become *his salvation*?
 - 5. In **Ps. 118:22**, to whom did *the stone* refer? How did the *builders reject this stone*?
 - 6. What did this *stone* become? Read **Ephesians 2:19-21**. What was the significance of a cornerstone in building? How did Jesus fulfill that function in our faith?
 - 7. When **Ps. 118:22 & 23** are considered together, why is this *marvelous in our eyes*?
 - 8. If we really did what **Ps. 118:24** says, what might we notice about our daily lives?
- II. Next read Matthew 9:35-38, utilizing several group members to each read one verse aloud. After reading the passage discuss it. If you are having trouble stimulating discussion, you can try asking some of the following questions:
 - 1. In Matthew 9:35, what do we learn about Jesus's ministry?
 - 2. What was *the gospel of the kingdom?*
 - 3. In Matthew 9:36, why did Jesus have compassion on the crowd?
 - 4. When the people are referred to as *sheep without a shepherd*, who did the missing shepherds represent?
 - 5. In **Matthew 9:37-38**, is Jesus instructing us to merely pray for more workers in the harvest? What is he also hoping we would do?
